No matter how simple, it has been arranged to have a class for practically any entry. Entries will be judged individually and not by comparison with other exhibits. Prize for the greatest number of points will be a flowering crab, the shrub that the Garden is advocating to beautify Birmingham.

There is no limit to the number of entries that may be made by one person. Mrs. Sander has pointed out.

One of the new classes this year will be the picture frame exhibit which is headed by Mrs. Arthur E. Roberts. There will also be an artistic arrangement group with eight different classes. Among the interesting classes in this group is that classifying in which any cut plant material may be arranged in or on a hat.
