Exchange Hears Chemical Engineer

The ways in which science is making life richer was outlined on Dr. Ernest Drake, professor of chemical engineering at Wayne University, in a talk before the Exchange Club, Tuesday noon.

Dr. Drake was introduced by Carlton Woodcock, president of the club. Next week's meeting will be the semi-annual election of officers.

The speaker pointed out that great progress had been made not only in the practical application of chemistry and physics, but also in the realm of pure research, citing the great advance of knowledge on the nature of matter—atoms, and molecules. The ions in a hydrogen atom are so small, he said, that if each were the size of a tiny ball, 1/100 inch in diameter, the amount of hydrogen in one gram would provide a pile 15 miles high in the form of a cube.

He spoke of the marvelous work done by the chemist DuPont, who went to Millard many years ago to extract bromine from the salt brine.
