Community Council to Consider Recreation Program for Summer

First meeting of the Birmingham Community Council will be held Tuesday morning at 9:30 at the Community House to approve the newly drafted constitution and to hear recommendations made by the recreation committee of this organization.

Delegates from Birmingham clubs who attend this meeting Tuesday morning will hear of the committee's report on the recreation program to be adopted for the coming season under the sponsorship of the council.

Recommendations, as drafted by the recreation committee of the council, include the formation of a recreation commission to consist of two representatives each from the Board of Education, City Commission and the recreation committee. It also provides that the school superintendent, the city manager and the chairman of the recreation committee be among the six members of the commission.

Playground activities, the committee has suggested, will be four centers: Barnum, Torrey, Adams and Quarton. It is recommended that the city supervise maintenance and use W. P. A. help as much as possible. Older young people could be used to help in the swimming pool and on the playgrounds and adult committees could be used to promote community sings and street dances, the committee report will point out.

Plans for this recreation program indicate that the season should continue for eight weeks, from June 17 through Aug. 9.
