Blissfield's Dazzling Late Offense Eliminates Maples in Final Minutes

A second half offensive-drive enabled Blissfield High School's cage team to blast Birmingham's undefeated Maple Leafs from the class B regionals at Ypsilanti last Friday, when the local lads bowled 43-41.

Forced to use a fast breaking offense, Birmingham came from behind to ring up a 16-12 lead in the opening quarter. Paul Kelley led the attack with seven points on some fine bits of under-basket shooting.

Trailing 28-19, after a fast and exciting first half, Blissfield turned into a whirlwind five as it put on a sensational last quarter spurt.

A dog shot by Mulder, curly-haired guard, and four quick sinkers by Blissfield's roney center, Paigel, led the Maples in front by
