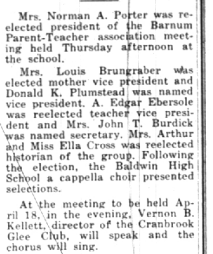

Retain Married Women Teachers League Suggests

The League of Women Voters feels the Board of Education should repeal its ruling against retaining women teachers who marry. The board plans to act on the question at its next meeting, the time of which has not been set.

Following is a resolution adopted by the League of Women Voters at its recent meeting: Whereas, opposition to discrimination in public employment based on sex or marital status has long been an important item on the program of the National League of Women Voters; and Whereas, the Birmingham School Board has adopted in 1934 prohibiting the hiring of additional married women teachers, as well as the general of contracts for unmarried women members of the teaching staff who marry, therefore,

Resolved, That the Birmingham League of Women Voters go on record as being in favor of the principle of opposition to discrimination in public employment based on sex or marital status.

School Vocational Service Outlined by Lloyd Chapman

"What will they be when they grow up?"

This is the vital question in most homes. The child and his adaptability in a modern world of a new minor concern in present-day educational trends. "Students need social guidance," he continued. "They need guidance in making adjustments that every student meets in the community, in school and in the home. In the past, the idea has been that a student should adjust himself to the school curriculum as best as he could. We know today that only about 50 per cent of the graduates go on to college. Most high school courses have been planned as college preparatory courses. Today we look into the student's life and his plans for the future and make every effort to give him courses that will enable him to carry on the work he must do.
