 Commissioner Moody said that taxes had not been paid for years and that "taxpayers have been carrying the burden. These fellows ought to go through the wringer just like I did in some of my investments."

He moved that the petition be denied. Packard at first declined to vote, saying, "I don't know what is right in this matter."

Asked for explanation, Moody pressed for an explanation of not voting, as required by city charter, he told City Clerk Irene E. Hanley, "I'll vote against denying the petition."

The two real estate men said that the companies had made no money in years and that "every cent had gone for taxes."

They plan to bid for certain lots in each of the subdivisions. The minimum price accepted will be one-quarter of the 1938 assessed valuations, with five years allowed for completing payment. In both subdivisions there are restrictions of a substantial nature.

Says Seven Trees Should Be Felled

Seven trees along several streets should be removed, City Manager Donald C. Egan informed the Commission, Monday night. Persons wishing to object may do so this evening.

Following is Egan's description of the trees:

1. 1227 W. Merrill, 4th tree east of Pierce street, soft maple, dead center branch, dangerous, adjoining branch sufficiently exposed of salvaging tree too great.
2. 227 W. Merrill, soft maple, badly shaped tree interfering with new planting; very little value in itself.
3. 415 W. Merrill, poplar, dangerous.
4. 546 W. Maple, soft maple, 2nd tree east of Bates, not much value; not worth trimming.
5. 3rd tree east of Bates, red maple, 4th tree east of Bates, tree dangerous, expense of salvaging too great.
6. 237 W. Corner of Willis and Woodward, soft maples, 2nd and 3rd trees on Willis, dangerous; tenant wishes trees removed.
7. 595 S. Bates, soft maple, dead and dangerous.

He headed a group of citizens who went out to "sell" Birmingham on the idea of voting for the sewage treatment plant. Mr. Olson has lived here since 1923.
