Community House To Be the Scene Of This Meeting

One of the unusual programs planned for the year is being arranged by members of the Baldwin P.-T. A. when that group meets Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock in the Community House.

Following the business meeting and election of officers for the coming year, Mrs. Lillian Diederich will present several piano selections and "The River," a United States government documentary film, will be shown.

For her portion of the program Mrs. Rosemary Will shall sing the arrangement of the Bach chorale, "I Call on Thee, Lord," a dance by Debussy, Szymanowski's "Etude" and "Rhapsody C Major" by Dohnanyi.

"The River," produced for the Farm Security Administration of the Department of Agriculture, is a dramatization of the Mississippi River—what it has meant to the country, what the government has done with the river and what the river has done to Americans.

In nine sequences the film traces life in the Great Valley of the last century and a half—the early days of cotton culture, the lumbering operations in the North and agriculture in the West.

A special symphonic score on "native American" themes has been written for this film by Yerga Thomson, young American composer. Music is played by an orchestra of first class musicians from the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Alexander Smallens.

D. A. R. Official Describes Life In Hills Of Kentucky

Members of Three Flag Chapter, Southfield D. A. R. held their monthly meeting at the home of Mrs. Donald Davidson, Moran road, last Wednesday. The guest of honor was Harriet Simmons, who is national vice president of children of D. A. R. as well as having charge of State children. Miss Simmons told of some of the projects of D. A. R. such as the maintenance of 14 schools throughout the country, especially in sparsely settled districts. In the hills of Kentucky no education at all buildings was provided, save those furnished by D. A. R. The houses in those parts are just shacks of two and three rooms constructed of triple logs. Doors and windows are never opening with little or no means of protection from the elements. Furnishings are the crudest imaginable, sometimes built of rough, unjointed boxes. This is the environment in which large families—the prevailing rule—is not uncommon to find ten or more people crowded into quarters such as those. Living almost in equatorial climates, people craving for the better things in life. Miss Simmons said upon investigating these so-called "hills," she found youngsters who fairly begged to have the privilege of attending school. It was an eye-opening task to select those whom the thought would most appreciate the opportunity. Miss Simmons stated the fact that each member of D. A. R. is assessed a dollar a year. Fifteen cents is deducted from each assessment to help support this worthy cause. A delightful luncheon was served by the hostess, Mrs. Davidson, and her helpers.
