(Continued from Page One) wiped off the city's accounts receiving an amount estimated by Treasurer Harold H. Carson at \$200,000 and \$300,000—this being principally unpaid taxes on vacant lots accumulated over a period of 15 years. The schools likewise lost a large amount. Because only 87 per cent of the tax roll was offered for sale was purchased, the remainder goes back to the state for off the tax roll, affording a further loss to city, schools and state until this property goes back into private ownership.

One-Quarter Valuation The sale permitted tax-deferred conveyors to buy back, in most cases, their property at a figure only one-quarter of the assessed valuation in 1938, regardless of the amount of back taxes due. The present lawsuit was brought by the Collateral Liquidation Corporation, which redeemed in the state 202 of its lots at Washington and Stanley streets, in the south part of the city. The corporation demanded in the suit that inasmuch as it does not pay taxes on the land, that no closing be assessed. (The roll is closed in about 30 days.) The corporation is asking, and a preliminary hearing is to be held Monday in Circuit Court, Pontiac. Commissioner H. Heacock said Monday night that "some say the minute the hammer fell at that sale, the owners were determined, dead or no dead." City Manager Egbert pointed out that the sale involved a contract, further evidence of ownership. About \$1,700 in taxes is involved, he said. Heacock added that the State Land Office Board is rushing the deeds and that they should all be in hand in 25 days.

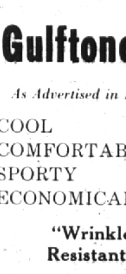
WPA Will Hold An Open House

(Continued from Page One) Sixteen feet wide and 88 feet long, the lobby will provide more than enough room for the commuters. There will be seven windows for the various postal services each finished in bronze. The four glassed-off desks are stationed in front of the outside windows. In the lobby there will be access to 285 lock-boxes, and Birmingham persons and firms will probably be given new box numbers, for the sizes in the old do not correspond in the new.

At the eastern end of the lobby, a door opens into the postmaster's office, which has an oak floor, a rug, and lavatory. The big workroom will provide long-needed space, especially during the Christmas holiday rush. At the western side, will be the Finance Section, separated from the workroom with wire mesh and wire doors, handling money orders, registered mail and postal savings. At the end of it is a vault set in concrete; another vault, for stamps, opens off the postmaster's office.

In the basement is a spacious room for the employes which will have lockers—it's called the "swing" room in postal parlance. Also in the basement is a big storage room and five smaller talker rooms, each with the steam boiler and fuel room.
