River Rouge Hands Baldwin First Defeat on Cinders

River Rouge High's track squad, Class A state champions, defeated Baldwin High thinclads 62 1/2 to 42 2/3 last Friday afternoon on Pierce Field track for the leaf's first defeat of the season.

Stroia, of River Rouge, was high scorer for the meet, netting 13 points while Allen, of Birmingham, followed with 10 points. Stroia won the high hurdles, the high jump and ran second in the low hurdles. Allen won the low hurdles and the 100-yard dash.

Besides Stroia's five, the Panthers placed first in the mile run, the 440, 220, pole vault, shot put and half mile, while Frank Armstrong was the only Baldwin man besides Allen to get a first when he won the broad jump.

Best marks in the meet were Stroia's 15.4 seconds for the high hurdles, Nam's heave of 43 feet 1 1/2 inches in the shot put and Allen's 13.9 seconds in the low hurdles.
