The famous ship locks at Sault Ste. Marie, just north of the Straits of Mackinac in Michigan's Upper Peninsula, will be open to the public beginning June 15, it was announced this month by Captain H. P. Wilcox, commandant at Fort Brady, Sault Ste. Marie. U. S. troops will remain on guard throughout the summer.

The locks, operated about seven months each year, handle a volume of marine tonnage about equal to that of the year-around Panama, Suez, and Kiel canals combined.
