

Drunk Driver Hits High Tension Pole

BLOOMFIELD HILLS—Overhead line crews for the Detroit Edison Company have repaired the damage done last Sunday morning at 3:20 o'clock when a tourist going south on Woodward avenue first struck an overhead car and then crashed into a pole in the center parkway, severing wires carrying 24,000-volt high tension power. The electric arcs could be seen for miles.

The driver, Vern Harris, of Galatia, Ill., was arrested by Bloomfield Hills police and charged with driving while under the influence of liquor. He was tried by Justice Arno Hulet, Monday, and was fined \$50 and \$5 costs. The top of his car was caved in by the falling pole, and both he and his wife, Mary, were given first aid. His car first collided with a machine driven by Charles J. Jenkins, 10081 Hiller road, Clarkston.

Congressional Comment by Representative George A. Dondero

Recently Mr. Millard W. Rice, national legislative representative of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, compiled some very informative statistics on veterans' affairs and the extent of this country's participation in the 1914-1918 war. A few selected excerpts from this compilation are particularly timely and I wish to include them in this comment.

The average age of American veterans of the World War is now 47 years and it is estimated that one out of 91 of these veterans will die each day during 1940. The total number was 4,191,172; 4,185,220 served in the army with nearly half of this number, 2,059,629, in service overseas. At the present time 4,041,920 are living.

The war casualties are revealed in these figures: Killed.....39,347 Army.....37,541 Marines.....1,450 Died of wounds.....13,999 Army.....12,354 Navy.....1,607 Combat deaths.....52,346 Army.....48,475 Marines.....2,457 Navy.....1,414 Died of disease.....75,460 Army.....62,670 Marines.....12,430 Navy.....3,356 Wounded, not mortally.....201,325 Army.....192,611 Marines.....8,714

Less than 9% of all World War veterans receive compensation for service-connected disabilities; the present time there are 342,072 receiving compensation for service-connected disabilities. \$2,938 are receiving pensions of \$6 to \$30 per month for permanent total non-service-connected disabilities. At this time there are 3,516 veterans of the Civil War, 2,525 veterans of Indian wars, and 165,710 veterans of the Spanish-American War receiving pensions.

The 141,020 veterans of the World War now living constitute 5.54% of our total adult population and about 43% of the adult population between the ages of 40 and 50 years.
