

November 16 Suggested as Date for Second Annual Community Institute

Council Meeting To Be Sept. 17 Board Decides

The date for the next meeting of the Community Council was set Tuesday morning and a suggested date for the second annual community institute was made by the executive board that met at that time.

Sept. 17 was set aside for the general meeting of the Council and the date suggested by the board for the institute is Nov. 16. The board also suggested that the institute this year be held in the afternoon and evening rather than the morning and afternoon as was the case for the first one held last fall.

The board suggested discussion groups meeting from 2 to 4 o'clock and from 4 to 6 p. m. Dinner would be served at 6:30 to 8 p. m. and discussion groups would again convene from 8 to 9:30. A general meeting from 9:30 to 10 o'clock would close the program.

It was suggested that the institute meet in the afternoon and evening to accommodate the men's groups that have joined the organization since its inception last November.

Thirty-one paid memberships are indicated to date, and eight other groups have petitioned to join, bringing the total to 39. A tentative budget of \$82 for the year was set-up by the board Tuesday and taken care of mimeographing and postage expenses.

Reports were also made by standing committees of the organization.
