Wells' Going Same Way, Wells Says "Nazism, Communism and Fascism are all moving in the same direction is the opinion of Charles A. Wells, Christian journalist, cartoonist and world traveler, who will speak nightly for a week at the First Baptist Church May 19 through May 26. He will also speak at the Exchange Club May 21. Mr. Wells returned to the United States at the outbreak of the war, following an extensive tour of Germany, Poland and Russia and other danger spots on the continent. "The surprising thing about today's European scene is the close similarity of trends among the forces which are professed to be so profoundly opposed to each other," reports Mr. Wells. "One common factor in Germany today after visiting Russia without realizing that Germany is experiencing much the same revolution as Russia, under a different name, which explains the recent tendency for Germany and Russia to collaborate. The effort molding a uniformity of public thought and action for the sake of the survival of all industry and individual enterprise is taking practically the same form—the same clear difference in the contrast between the natural methodical efficiency of the German and the natural inefficiency of the average Russian."
