Fall Fruits, Vegetables and Leaves Are Used in Graceful Table Settings

Fall fruits, vegetables and leaves were beautifully used by women in the arrangement class, which met Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock immediately preceding the Birmingham branch of the Woman's National Farm and Garden association at the Community House.

Presiding at this discussion group was Mrs. Clyde L. Hagerman, who analyzed the arrangements and criticized them, making suggestions and comments on each group.

A most effective and highly original arrangement was the one made by Mrs. George D. Miller, a prettily crisp little shallow box setting where lettuce and broccoli which had already gone to seed were used together with several colorful radishes in a highly polished little wooden dish.

Another unusual arrangement was one by Mrs. Harry M. Denney, a horn of plenty filled to overflowing with apples, grapes and pears, sprawling gracefully onto the table.

The table arrangement, done by Mrs. Jonathan M. Ball, was beautifully carried out in the fall fruits and vegetables, all home grown, and piled casually and gracefully into a large straw basket.

Several table arrangements, especially arranged for the occasion by Mrs. Hagerman were on view at this short meeting and were discussed briefly by the leader. Particularly attractive was a display of dried bush, cones and brilliant little peppers to add a brilliant spot to the old wooden soup strainers in which the arrangements were placed. These soup strainers were placed on small wooden relish dishes and a tiny Mexican figure was used to carry out the color scheme of the wood and red peppers.

A tremendous table arrangement, with great bulk and very little line, and yet unusual and original, was the great cluster of fresh cut off with just a touch of squash and sage. This arrangement which had height toward the left side and which sloped gradually, gracefully to a smaller cluster on the right hand side, gave a sense of bountifulness symbolic of Thanksgiving.
