### St. Dunstan's Performance Well Received by Local Critic

Anything having to do with the mind is of especial interest and for this reason the play given by St. Dunstan's Guild of Cranbrook should be given merited comment.

This play was given Friday and Saturday evenings at Brookside auditorium to appreciative audiences. From a story by Hugh Walpole and made into play form by Edward Chodorov, the English and Russian flavor is not difficult to discern.

A madcap as well as a Miesow element is apparent in this unusual dramatization which has to do with a group of rogues who make a prisoner of the "Kind Lady" who has befriended the ringleader. They take over her home, dispose of her properties and almost take control of her mind after making an invalid of her.

This present-day procedure is not uncommon since people have surrendered in social and national groups and thence as nations to invaders who have disposed of them before realization has set in. Our nation is not immune to philosophies that have dispossessed us of that to which we were formerly accustomed. For this reason the unfolding of the play "Kind Lady" was not especially strange, only unusual for the reason that such things should not be permitted to happen.

Mary Merries, the kind lady, the

calm and demure creature who was victimized was done with distinction by Mrs. Hubert V. Davis. Henry Abbot played by David Walker Lee was the rascal whose objectivity never wavered for an instant. This human anger was forever boiling, either with or without, and not satisfied at personal achievement was augmented by other terms. An excellent portrayal of this part.

Ada, the wife, was played by the wife of Mr. Lee. Posing as an invalid she is the kind lady's chaste female rogue arose from the sick bed to dance a sprightly dance in a homely cotton night gown that graced floors many years ago.

Mrs. Edwards, a fellow rascal of Henry Abbot was played by Henry Whiting in a faultless manner.

The part of Ade Edwards, assigned to Mrs. Benjamin Brewster, was, to this reviewer, an outstanding characterization. A better bit of pantomime has not been witnessed.

Should some local producer sketch for Dave Lee in a Boris Karloff style, Henry Whiting is a W. C. Fields, and Mrs. Brewster a female Harpo Marx or Charles Chaplin, there is no question but that this trio would have repeat performances.
