International Relations class was entertained last Tuesday with a summary of the new play, "There Shall Be No Night," written by Robert Sherwood, and presented by three Birmingham residents.

Mrs. Helen Eden is well known as a gifted trouper in St. Dunstan's Guild. She read the feminine roles with finesse.

Robert Hill is on the staff at Cranbrook. His fervor and brilliance in presenting his parts in "There Shall Be No Night" brought out clearly the profound thoughts Robert Sherwood so aptly puts down on paper.

Vernon Kellelt is a teacher of languages at Cranbrook. He read his lines with assurance last Tuesday morning.

The play, which by the way will appear in Birmingham in Detroit, with Fontaine and Lunt in the leads, is a story of the fall of Finland and its immediate effect on the lives in a suburban home. It pictures the doom, the disaster, the privations this peace loving family have to endure. It brings out the courage each member of the family displays when driven in desperation to take upon themselves tasks they are wholly untried for.

It is not a happy play. It leaves one with dark thoughts—yet it infects most of us, too, have been sheltered somewhat, coddled all our lives, we know in our hearts should evil befall our nation, we too can rise to the occasion.

Ruth Shain said at the conclusion of the play "that perhaps it gives more than we are willing to give." She warned the class "not to be dismayed at the thought of what we may have to do in the future as being so different from what we have always done, but to take courage and keep ourselves during these sorrowful times as busy as our strength will permit."
