Members of the Boy Scouts of America pride themselves that "there are no sofas in Scouting." Citing their record as aides to rescue workers, first-aid men, and message bearers in time of disaster, they are equally proud that they are prepared to serve their community in hundreds of less spectacular ways. Their day-to-day program, Scouts insist, keeps them ready and eager to help in any manner that is needed.

Some idea of the service rendered in the past 20 years is available in the records of the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America. A quick survey shows that the khaki-clad youngsters sold Liberty Bonds worth \$147,000,000, have saved many lives, delivered half a million Thanksgiving baskets to needy families, participated in many first-aid courses for lost persons, guarded school crossings, fought fires, cleaned up unsightly vacant lots, acted as color guards, assisted in controlling traffic, ushered at public and private ceremonies, aided in hunting out the voters campaign—even helped rescue a parachute jumper caught in a tree. Scouts do not, however, solicit money for any cause.

Gardeners' Corner

In the chemical too long a time as to place them. Insects may be rooted by thinning them in sand in a cold frame now and having them there until spring. Over precaution that must be observed in making any kind of cutting is that the sand or mixture of sand and peat used as the substance to hold the cuttings must be packed down very firmly. Use a block of wood to pound it solid; insert cuttings in a line made by running a knife through the sand. From the sand around the roots with the block and water carefully so as not to disturb the cuttings. Any air holes will lead to decay. Moisture should surround the cuttings, so unless you can supply it by placing your cuttings in a glass box like an old aquarium with a pane of glass cuttings must be watered. Never let the sand dry out.

FALL CUTTINGS
Cuttings of most evergreens and deciduous trees may be made from October through December, but freezing cuttings of trees to 10 inches from the top this year's growth.
