

**New Stuart Chase Book on Shelves of Baldwin Library**

Hoards of gold uselessly buried in the earth, Nylon, the Dust Bowl, WPA — great gran'pappy would never have recognized those as forces influencing his chance of livelihood. His world was fairly secure, and should the going prove a bit difficult, he could always trek West, where golden opportunities lay around begging to be picked up.

The present generation must reckon with them, however, in these troubled times that began in 1929. The "immutable laws of economics" of the past generations offer no solution, so Stuart Chase comes forward with *Idle Men*, a guide to this new economic world.

Idle capital, idle workers, old age pensions, unbalanced budgets, saturated markets, falling population curves, are some of the issues discussed by Mr. Chase with his customary forcefulness.

**They Wanted War**, by Otto D. Tolchus. Based on a quotation from one of Hitler's speeches against the Democrats — "They wanted war, they shall have it," this is a psychological study of Hitler and the German people. The author describes the building of the German war machine — how and when, and the men who built it. He depicts life in a Germany preparing for war. The book as a whole is a portrait of a totalitarian state in growth and in action.

**The Writer's Market**, by Aron Mathieu. Where to sell that story you have been hating in the hot drawer of your desk — the one that the *Pacific Monthly* turned down so politely. Personal of this little book would have indicated that you should have sent your brain child to the *Chills* and *Their Weekly*. A useful handbook giving name of publisher and publisher, address, type of material accepted and remuneration, if any included are publishers of professional and trade publication, play and song publishers.

**Three Cities**, by D. L. Murray. A novel with scenes laid in Rome, London and Paris, during the days of the third century.

**Adventure North**, by Katherine Pinkerton. The story of an adventure troupe family living a nomadic life in the Canadian north land.

**Sue Barton**, Superintendent of Nurses, by Helen Boylston. The irrepressible Sue, having adventured through three books appears in a fourth lively novel of hospital life.

**Single Stones**, by Gertrude Mallette. The story of an energetic young medical student taking his first steps along the hard road of scientific research.

**Seavenger Sale Re-offering Set**

The re-offering sale of Oakland County State-owned lands, announced at the first seavenger sale, has been definitely set to begin in the Masonic Temple Bldg., No. 1 Lafayette St., in the City of Pontiac, Nov. 25, 1940, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon and will continue from day to day until the sale is completed. It will be a public auction, and owners will have no such preference or priority as they were given at the first public sale. It is estimated that approximately 50,000 acres will be re-offered and that the sale will take several weeks to complete.

**Arrange Logs For Air Circulation**

To avoid the annoyance of a smoky, smothering blaze lay the logs in the fireplace in such a way that air can circulate between them. Put the largest log in the back and roll it forward when it is burning hotly, replacing it with another. The smaller logs in front, with small sticks sandwiched between. If logs are perfectly smooth and straight, hold them apart with small pieces of wood. Ignite the wood by placing a wad of excelsior or a tightly wadded piece of newspaper where the flames will pass up through the piled wood. Always try to use dry well-seasoned wood.

**Relax Requirements For Skilled Hands**

DETROIT—Employers in many Michigan cities are relaxing their requirements for various types of skilled and semi-skilled workers. It was revealed in a labor market report released by Harry A. McDonald, Chairman of the Michigan Unemployment Compensation Commission.

"No stringency in the general labor supply has developed as yet," McDonald said, "but the usual seasonal gain in automobile and related manufacturing, together with preliminary activity resulting from the awarding of contracts in connection with the National Defense Program, has ex-

ceeded to absorb many of the unemployed. As a result," McDonald continued, "there have been evidences of marked changes in employers' hiring practices during recent weeks. Maximum age requirements have been relaxed by many companies in favor of selection of the individual on the basis of actual physical condition of the individual. "By means of its State-wide clearance system, the Michigan State Employment Service is attempting, wherever possible, to redistribute the available skilled and semi-skilled labor supply to meet the needs of industry," McDonald said. "We also are doing all we can to acquaint the public with the National Defense Training Program."

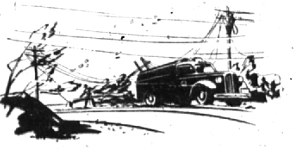
