Holiday Fruit Cake Much Improved By Time, Cooking Editor Maintains

Fruit cake is much improved by time—standing allows the many kinds of fruits and spices to blend together to make a delightful cake. There are two kinds of fruit cakes: a dark one which is heavily spiced, made with brown sugar or molasses, which adds to the spicy flavor. The white fruit cake is made without spices. The cakes may be baked by steamed according to the recipe.

Bake your fruit cake a day or so before you wish to use it. Layer Fruit Cake 8 egg whites, 1 cup butter, 1 cup milk, 2 cups sugar.

Dark Fruit Cake 1 dozen eggs, 1/2 cup butter, 1 1/2 pounds flour, 2 cups sugar, 1/2 cup molasses.

Filling 8 egg yolks, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup butter. Mix the above ingredients and cook until thick. Add 1 cup of raisins, 1 cup of currants and 1 cup of grated coconut. Put between layers and on top of cake.

White Fruit Cake II 4 eggs, 1 cup butter, 2 cups sugar, 2 cups flour, 1 cup black walnuts chopped, 1 cup almonds chopped, 1 pound pineapple cut fine, 1 pound citron cut fine, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 teaspoon of lemon.

Mix and bake in loaf pans as other fruit cakes.

White Fruit Cake I 1/2 pound butter, 1/2 pound sugar, 6 eggs, 2 cups grated coconut, 1/2 pound flour, 1/2 pound citron, 1/2 pound shell almonds, 1/2 pound shell pecans.

Poor Men's Cake 1/2 cup butter, 1/2 cup watermelon rind preserves, 2 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 cup nuts chopped, 1/2 cup raisins, 2 cups flour, 1/2 pound coconut, 1/2 teaspoon mace.

Pound Cake 1 pound butter, 1 pound sugar, 12 eggs, 12 teaspoons cream of tartar, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 cup molasses, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/2 cup nuts.
