## Democracy Crisis Will Be Discussed By Olive Hormel

"The Crisis of Democracy," a discussion of the first of the eyewitness narratives of the present American political scene, is the subject of the second lecture in the series on current books and plays given at Baldwin Public Library by Olive Deane Hormel as a feature of the University of Michigan Extension Service. The lecture will be presented at 2 o'clock, Monday afternoon. The originally scheduled lecture will be given later in the season.

Proceeding the talk on "The Crisis of Democracy," Miss Hormel will repeat her first lecture on "Makers of Modern Books." This lecture is from 1 to 2 o'clock and will be followed by the regularly scheduled talk. ## Travel Group To Hear Talk On East Indies

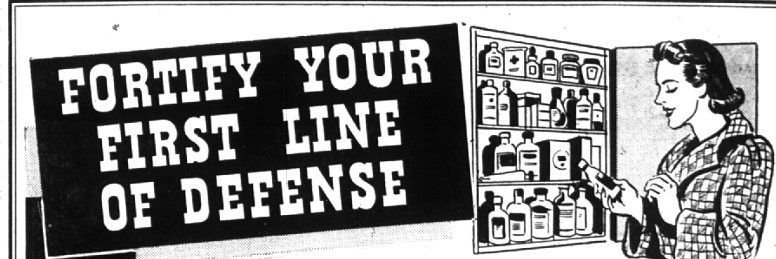
