Texas Christian Next for U. of D.

DETROIT—Detroit football fans who have been clamoring for years to see a real "big time" football game in this city, will have their prayers answered next Saturday when Texas Christian will be the guest of the University of Detroit in the Titan stadium. There can be no doubt of the quality of the Horned Frogs, nor of their right to be rated among the nation's best. They were champions of the Southwest Conference two years ago and were rated No. 1 in the country by many experts. Furthermore, they have the best record of the seven teams competing that conference over the long stretch, with a winning percentage of .641, including three victories over Oklahoma.

The Texans will present a squad that lists 19 men who weigh over 200 pounds and 29 who stand six feet tall or better. Every man on the roster is a Texan, too, which is rather a different picture than that presented by some of the other teams, which lately have drawn their strength largely from the North.

It isn't mere size that makes the Horned Frogs formidable, however. They have the reputation of being the best passing team in the country, year in and year out.

Sports Showup

Here are a few statistics on the Birmingham eleven after the first six games:

The Maroons have scored 122 points this year to their opponents', scoring 39 against Cranbrook for the most points in one game.

On rushing, the Baldwin boys gained 1,416 yards, 100 more scrimmage to the opposition's 541 yards, along with 70 first downs to their opponents' 25.

In the line of passing, Birmingham is 50-50, having passed 47 times and completed 23.

The Maples' punting is also tops, with 19 punts booted for a total distance of 55 yards a punt.

The only dark spot in the picture has been the penalties. Birmingham has lost 300 yards on penalties to their opponents' more than 85 yards.

Early in the fourth quarter of the Fendale game when Al Jones, left tackle, was charging through the line to get his opponent, his helmet was ripped off his head and the force carried the helmet about seven yards in the direction of the Fendale goal.

Al's helmet was silver and the football was painted white; so when a Fendale player noticed a light object resembling a football rolling toward him, he immediately pounced on it, thinking he had recovered a fumble. Then Al came up and demanded his helmet stuck to the Fendale player's chin.

Two boys on this year's eleven should be particularly noted. Both play on the line and are doing excellent jobs. There is Jim Lee, right end, who weighs only 137 pounds but has played a fine end this year. Jim has also figured in a lot of the passes.

Then, too, is Dick Neely, left tackle, who has literally cut his opponent to pieces in every game. Dick is really playing football this year.

What about Bill Tight? Bill is a star who has played tackle for the past two seasons, but recently was converted into a center because of the loss of John Adams. Immediately after Adams' boss Harold Watts took the post at center. But Watts is only a tenth grader without too much experience. So maybe Bill Tight will help fill in the center post in a week or so.

When Fendale tied Birmingham last Friday night, it won one of its biggest victories of the year, a moral victory. Up to the Birmingham game Fendale had been beaten in all but two of its games. But when it tied a team with a record like Birmingham's it had won a victory.

Birmingham will finish the season with three more home games, meeting Plymouth next Friday. Plymouth is a team that one can never be sure about. One week it will win a game and next week lose it as easy one.
