

Euclid Ave. Zoning Hearing Oct. 21

An informal hearing has been called for Monday evening, Oct. 21, by the City Commission to permit discussion of the proposed change in zoning on Euclid avenue between Ferndale and Park. Zoning now permits two family homes and two are now situated there, but a petition recently was submitted asking a change to single family, a change which would not affect the present two-family homes.

The petition was apparently directed at use to be made of a vacant lot on Euclid which Hugh Keyes, architect, has bought and plans to use for a two-family home.

A sketch of the proposed building was shown by the City Commission Monday night. Several commissioners commented that the place resembled a single family home. Only one main entrance was obvious. The other opens off a porch.

So far, the Commission has not indicated any willingness to change the zoning.

Progress of Sweden On Adventure Series

That a democracy can abolish poverty, create jobs for all and operate efficiently without sacrificing the liberty of anyone has been proved by Sweden, according to Wilfrid Husband, world traveler and student of international affairs, who will give a lecture, illustrated with natural color motion pictures, on "Sweden—Where Human Values Count," at the Detroit Institute of Arts, Woodward at Kirby, next Sunday afternoon, Oct. 13, at 3:30.

"Sweden has abolished slums, has raised farm prices without raising the price of food, has cut medical costs to a point where one can have his appendix removed for only \$7.50 and in the face of all this has created a treasury surplus," says Mr. Husband.
