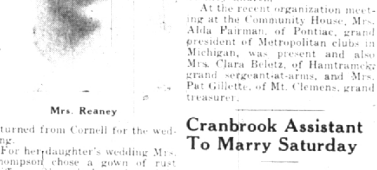
returned from Cornell by the wedding.
