The account will be operated in the same manner that any checking account is operated with the exception that there will be no maintenance charge nor any minimum balance requirement.

Each deposit will cost five cents and may include one free out-of-town item.

Each additional out-of-town item so deposited will cost five cents.

Each check drawn against the account will cost five cents.

Each check will bear a number corresponding to the ledger account number, and statements of these accounts will be made available every ninety days.

The plan may be adopted by individuals or joint depositors.

It is anticipated that this Plan will serve its purpose in making available to the people of this community a unique banking facility.
