ORDINANCE NUMBER 264 AWNING ORDINANCE
An act to amend the ordinance providing for the erection and maintenance of awnings, canopies, and other public places in the City of Birmingham.

Section 1. Movable Awnings. Movable awnings, canopies, or other structures supported by posts or poles, shall be erected at a distance equal to two feet from the sidewalk or street.

Section 2. Canopies. Canopies of fixed awnings projecting over the sidewalk shall conform to the following regulations: (a) Canopies shall be supported entirely from the building.

Section 3. Awnings. Awnings or marquees shall be at least eight feet in height above the sidewalk and shall project not more than eighteen inches (18 in.) beyond the building line, except that then such canopy or marquee is ten feet (10 ft.) in clear above the sidewalk.

Section 4. Temporary Awnings. Temporary awnings, canopies, or other structures may be erected and maintained over the sidewalk of any street for temporary use as a protection during the erection of a building.

Section 5. Advertising. Advertising on movable awnings, canopies, or other structures shall be restricted to the following: (a) Signs and notices shall not be permitted on awnings or marquees except that there may be announced change of provisions.

I'll Leave It To You . . .

In an address delivered Sept. 14, William Mather Lewis, president of Lafayette College, said, among other things, "We have heard a great deal about radicalism in our colleges and about its destructive doctrines being taught there. But the vast majority of the men who are teaching American students are men of the highest quality to whom we like to call the American way of life."

Denler. Lewis is right, and I suppose he is. After all, most of us Americans have the right to expect that those charged with the task of teaching our children should be Americans through and through. While I am very glad to hear that the majority is so constituted, this does not satisfy me unless I should imagine that every last one of our teachers—both in our colleges, high school and grade school as well—should not be free from the pink plague. And yet, Dr. Lewis, by his very phraseology, implies that this is not the case.

Last Saturday, while in Ann Arbor attending the football game, I picked up a copy of the Michigan Daily, the official student publication, and read with interest an account of a presidential poll participated in by the faculty. A most interesting fact was that I found that a little over fifty per cent of the professors and instructors who voted favored Mr. Roosevelt, although I suppose I should have expected it in view of the position of importance to which the President has elevated the sporting board boys and their pet theories.

But what really made me sit up and take notice was the fact that three members of the faculty had voted for Earl Browder, American Number 1 Communist. Only about half the faculty took part in the poll, so we should be safe in assuming that at least six of them had voted for Roosevelt. Yet there is the responsibility of teaching American youth 40 to 50 per cent of the formative stages of its life, and their salaries are being paid by the State of Michigan—yet just who those pink pigs are I am not sure. What do you say we hurry ourselves with making America safe for democracy before we attempt to save the world?
