General Election NOTICE TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM COUNTY OF OAKLAND, STATE OF MICHIGAN

Notice is hereby given that a General Election will be held in the City of Birmingham, in the County of Oakland and State of Michigan, on

Tuesday, November 5, 1940

from seven o'clock in the forenoon until eight o'clock in the afternoon, Eastern Standard Time for the purpose of electing the following officers: President of the United States, Vice President of the United States, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney General, State Treasurer, Auditor General, Justice of the Supreme Court (To fill vacancy) for term ending Dec. 31, 1943, United States Senator, Representative in Congress, 17th District, State Senator, 12th District, Representative in State Legislature, Judge of Probate, Prosecuting Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk, County Treasurer, Registrar of Deeds, (3) Circuit Court Commissioners, Drain Commissioner, (2) Coroners, and to vote on the following propositions:

- A proposed amendment to Section 21 of Article X of the Constitution relative to authorizing a tax on property in addition to the 15 mill limitation for school purposes.
A proposed amendment to Article VI of the State Constitution by adding Section twenty-two relative to providing for establishing a system of civil service for state employment, etc.

- The question of the approval or rejection of Section 3 of Article I of Act No. 261, of the Public Acts of 1939. (The Michigan Public Service Commission).
The question of the approval or rejection of Act 122 of the Public Acts of 1939, will be submitted. (Practice of Dentistry).
The question of the adoption or rejection of Act No. 147 of the Public Acts of 1939, (The Parkway Playground proposal).

CITY OF BIRMINGHAM CHARTER AMENDMENTS
An amendment to provide by ordinance for the licensing, regulating, restricting, and limiting the number and locations of billboards within the city.
An amendment to continue the existing method of electing the public library board, with the same powers and duties as heretofore. (Necessitated by the city passing the 10,000 population mark).

Plan and Specifications
All sidewalks shall be constructed in conformity with the plans on file in the Engineering Department and in accordance with the standard specifications of the City of Birmingham. All concrete sidewalks shall be finished and finished days after placement, be capable of receiving a weight of 25,000 pounds per square foot without failure.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 267 Sidewalk Ordinances
AN ORDINANCE to regulate the construction, repair or replacement of sidewalks in the City of Birmingham and amend all ordinances in conflict herewith.
Section 1. Commission Resolution
The Commission of the City of Birmingham shall by resolution determine the necessity, extent and location of the construction or repair of any sidewalk in any street or alley in the City of Birmingham and shall declare the intention of the City to make such improvement.
Section 2. Notice
The City Clerk shall notify the owners of property adjoining the sidewalk which it is proposed to construct, reconstruct or repair of the intention of the City to make such improvement and assess the cost thereof against the abutting lots in proportion to frontage.

Section 3. Plans and Specifications
All sidewalks shall be constructed in conformity with the plans on file in the Engineering Department and in accordance with the standard specifications of the City of Birmingham. All concrete sidewalks shall be finished and finished days after placement, be capable of receiving a weight of 25,000 pounds per square foot without failure.
Section 4. Permit
No sidewalk shall be constructed or reconstructed in the City of Birmingham without a permit being obtained therefor from the City Clerk. The City Clerk shall be authorized to issue such permit upon payment of a fee to the City Treasurer in the amount of five per cent thereof with a minimum fee of \$10.00. This permit shall be governed by the conditions and specifications attached to each permit.
