Deer Archer Gets Close to Target

KALAMAZOO—The successful archer stalks his deer to within 25 or 30 yards and kills it with a single arrow. Three bowmen who bagged their bucks in 1939 did just that, and others among the

140 replying to the questionnaire of K. E. Palmatier, secretary-treasurer of the Michigan Archers association, hunted in the same way. Last season Michigan had 500 archers in the deer country. This year the special bow and arrow season again is Nov. 1-14 inclusive. In heavy brush some longbowmen reported getting shots as close as 10 yards, and 20 yards

is a favorite shooting distance. Top limit for many of them is 40, 45 or 50 yards, though a few confessed to 100-yard shots, and one to a 120-yard try. Archers noting a great preponderance of does in some areas suggest making these fair targets for arrows also. Some complained of how noisy bird hunters spoiled their fun. Even the twang of the bowstring makes a second shot at

the same target unlikely. Hunting Indian style brought most of the hunters one to five shots, though some reported they saw no deer they could be sure were bucks within 50-yard range.
