Broken Ankle Bone Benches Adams for Season

East Detroit's javit moving green and white squad will come to Birmingham tomorrow afternoon in what will no doubt be one of the most exciting games of the year. Dedication of the new flag pole will be a feature.

Among the more brilliant East Detroit griders will be seen Fred Bolle, quarterback with three years as a regular. He does all the punting, passing and a goodly share of the running. Captain Eli Thayer, also a regular for three years, has made but one pass from center in that time and has never had time out for an injury. Thayer is an excellent leader and defensive player.

Top-Notch Guard
Another powerful addition is Art Knepper about whom Coach Rockwell says, "He is the best guard I have ever coached or seen play."

Birmingham fans will once again see the familiar figure of Hugh Mack, powerful right half for the Maroons. Dick Neely, one of the hardest working fellows on the squad, who tore gapping holes in the Dearborn wall last Friday,

will fill the left tackle position, much to the Maroons' advantage. The East Detroit line up will be as follows: Captain Eli Thayer, center; guards Capner and Ruppel; tackles, Schook and Oelmeier; ends, Snoeberger and Schang; halfbacks, Puz and Shipley; fullback, Tomlinson; quarterback, Bolle.

Adams on Sidelines
There will be a deep feeling of regret felt by both players and fans when Johnny Adams lines up on the bench Friday as a spectator. Johnny broke a bone in his ankle in the Dearborn game and will be out indefinitely. It is hoped, however, that he may be able to play in the Royal Oak game. Johnny was star center for the Maples and his life ambition has been to play on the team that defeated Royal Oak and won the Little Brown Jug.

Filline Adams, positioned on the ball will be Watts, flanked by Kennedy at right guard; Ballard at left guard; Garfield, right tackle; Neely, left tackle; Leo, right end; Olson, left end; Mack, right half; Hopkins, left half; Merrill, full back; Armstrong, quarterback.

If the boys do not become overconfident after their victory over Dearborn, the Leafs should take the East Detroit squad. However, there is a definite feeling that anything can happen in football.

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Still Undefeated, Still Untied, Still Unscored-on

Continuing its march toward a second consecutive Twin Valley League title, the Birmingham High School football team remained undefeated, untied, and unscored upon by whitewashing Dearborn High School 5-0 last Friday at the Dearborn field. It was the third Twin Valley victory of the year for the Maple Leafs, Wayne and Ypsilanti having gone down in previous games with Birmingham.

Many passes, interceptions and penalties featured and made the game the most interesting contest played this far. Baldwin scored the eight points on a second quarter safety and a fourth quarter touchdown drive.

Jim Adams Hurt
Mc-foul-upped Birmingham squad in the first quarter when John Adams, star center, was fumbled by a Dearborn player. He will be unable to play again this year.

Dearborn showed the best of form in display by a Birmingham opponent this year.

Jim Lee and Dale Ballard bolstered the line play as the reliable Birmingham linebacks featured nicely for long gains. Special recognition is due Harold Watts, defensive center, who played superbly after replacing the injured Adams.

In the first eight minutes of the game, Dearborn held a slight advantage, once progressing as far as the Baldwin 42, but the match was halted there.

Later the Maroons took the ball on their own 17 after a kick, and through the combined efforts of Bill Hopkins, Hugh Mack and Bill Merrill, carried it to the Dearborn 38 as the first quarter ended.

On five plays, Mack and Merrill pushed the ball on the Dearborn line. After it had been ploughed to the one yard line on three plays, anything was stopped on the one-inch line.

Miss "Pay Dirt"
Again taking the ball on Dearborn's 20 after Dearborn punned out, the Maple Leafs moved to the eight yard line where once more they hit the ball on downs, short of "pay dirt."

Dearborn's Reader then faked a punt and threw a lateral to Merrill behind the goal line. To the joy of the Birmingham fans, Jim Lee broke through and caught Mack behind the line for a safety, making the score 2-0.

However, the excitement did not end there for immediately a brilliant lateral from Merrill to Hopkins following Dearborn's kickoff brought the ball back again into scoring territory on the Dearborn 25-yard line.

On the first play, Porthoff, Dearborn center, intercepted a Birmingham pass and raced beautifully 70 yards before he was tackled from behind on the Maroons' 15. Much to the disgust of Dearborn rooters, clipping was ruled on the play which offset half of the gain and placed the ball back near midfield.

Two plays later the half ended with Baldwin leading 2-0.

Later in the third quarter Dearborn, sparked by brilliant passes from Mack to Leo, took the 14 yard line, where they missed a first down by inches.

After a punt, Birmingham started its only successful scoring drive when Mack intercepted a pass near midfield. A forward and lateral from Mack to Leo to Joe Armstrong took the ball to the 23. Merrill and Mack made it a first down on the eight yard line.

After another clipping penalty had nullified an end run touchdown sprint by Mack a pass ruled complete because of interference made a first down on the two. On the next play Mack scored standing up on a cut through right tackle. On the try for the extra point, Kelly missed the posts by inches, making the score Birmingham 8, Dearborn 0.

All the remaining games on the schedule are tough and the boys will need all the support from Birmingham fans that they can receive.

Tomorrow, Friday, Oct. 25, Birmingham entertains East Detroit in a non-league game at Pierce field.
