

Robert K. Hall to Discuss South American Political Illiteracy

Cranbrook Man Will Talk Nov. 5 To Woman's Club

The new department of the Birmingham Woman's club, the Pan American Group, will sponsor the Nov. 5 meeting and have as its speaker, Robert King Hall, of Cranbrook School.

Mr. Hall's subject will be, "Political Illiteracy in South America" and will deal with the rate of illiteracy in Argentina, Brazil and Chile and with the political crises arising from such illiteracy, also with the large scale government efforts being made to correct this condition.

He will speak also on the problems presented by the schools instituted by the German and Japanese factions, which enlist the youth of those countries into the Fascist way of thinking.

A travel talk, entitled, "Seven Trails to el Pacifico," will also be given by Mr. Hall. This talk, describing the modern and comfortable means of travel across South America by the seven ancient trade routes of the colonial period, have all been personally traveled by the speaker.

Robert King Hall is a Pan American Airways Fellow to Argentina; Michigan Exchange Fellow to Brazil, (given by the Hamarati) University of Michigan Travel Fellow to Ecuador (University of Chile); lecturer at the University of Tucuman (Argentina); research at the Instituto Nacional de Estudios Pedagogicos (Brazil); lecturer at Santiago, Tucuman, Buenos Aires, La Plata, Sao Paulo, Rio de Janeiro, Curitiba and Balua.
