# Maple Football Team Goes to Wayne for Game Tomorrow

## Opposing Coach A College Chum of George Wurster

If their opening games are any criterion, two powerful grid teams will meet in Wayne tomorrow at 3:30 as two old school chums pit the products of their skill and wit against each other in the form of Birmingham's fighting eleven and Wayne's squad of scrappers.

Coach Roy Myers, of Wayne, and Birmingham's Coach George Wurster, who fought shoulder to shoulder as teammates at Western State Teacher's College, will pit the best of their beef trusts in one of the hardest games either team will see this year, each striving to break the tie which ended the game last season here in Birmingham.

**Wayne Beaten Last Week**  
Last week Birmingham defeated Cranbrook in a rollicking game by the score of 39-0, while Wayne lost its match in the powerful Class A school at Ann Arbor, being defeated 19-0.

High Mack, Maple Leaf ground-graining right half, will be seen more in the Wayne encounter than in the Cranbrook game, as he sacrificed himself to give his team some opportunity to carry the ball.

Over on the Wayne side of the field will be the quarter-back who tore the lines last year. He was shot in the foot this summer and also suffered a brain concussion.

However, Coach Myers stated he is as good as new.

The lighter Wayne team averages 160 pounds in the line and 155 in the backfield, while Birmingham averages 166 all around.

The Wayne line-up for Friday will start: Huberts, at center; right guard, Bradford; left guard, Cornish; right tackle, Ojalaga; left tackle, Kunder; right end, Reidman; left end, Landish; quarter-back, Montgomery; fullback, Boney; right half, Scotter; left half, Elerts. The line-up is much the same as last year. Wayne had lost last year of one 162-pound.

Buick finished fourth in the league standings in the regular season with a record of 12 victories against four defeats. Dagny's finished second with a record of 19 triumphs against four losses. The Buick team was a whole lot better than it looked.

**Next 3 U. of D. Games At Night**

DETROIT—One of the odd features of the University of Detroit schedule this season is that the Titans do not play a single Saturday game until Nov. 2, when they meet Tulsa at Detroit. Their next three games are played on Friday evening, with Catholic University and Michigan Normal at home and with Manhattan in New York.

The fifth game is scheduled for Sunday, October 27, with Villanova at Philadelphia. The Sunday date was agreed on in order to avoid a conflict with Temple and Swarthmore, both of which have home games on that Saturday afternoon. The four November games, with Tulsa, Texas Christian and Manhattan at home and with Gonzaga at Spokane, Wash., are all on Saturday afternoons.

Incidentally the Titans play six home games this season, only their Manhattan, Villanova and Gonzaga dates being scheduled for foreign fields. But all three trips are fairly long ones and the jump to Spokane, with one exception, the lengthiest they have ever taken. Two years ago they went to Sacramento to beat Santa Clara 7 to 0 in an upset that the Pacific Coast is still talking about.
