

# Baldwin Beats Cranbrook Team 39-0 in Opener

Completely overwhelming the Cranbrook football team by the score of 39-0, Birmingham High School impressively won the opening game of the year at Pierce Field last Friday afternoon.

Influenced by the brilliant play of their whole team, the Birmingham rooters were never in doubt of the outcome. Many in the crowd intercepted passes paved the way for the high score.

Even at first. Within the first seven minutes of the first quarter, the game appeared to be evenly matched. But it was not so. Paul Kelly intercepted a Cranbrook pass on his own 40 yard line and raced 25 yards to yard line and received the first score. The conversation was mixed, however.

Almost before the spectators had regained their seats, Birmingham recovered a fumble on Cranbrook's 40 yard line. Dile Olson made a first down on the 25 as the first quarter ended. A 12 yard pass from Olson to Joe Armstrong and a 12 yard gain by Bill Hopkins made two more first downs and put the ball on the one-foot line.

From there Hugh Mack plowed through for the touchdown and Ted Corson kicked the extra point. A little later, after a nice punt return by Frank Armstrong, Hopkins ran 33 yards through the bewildered defense of the opponents to the third touchdown, and immediately, however, Joe Armstrong intercepted a pass and ran 25 yards to bring the score to 26-0.
