Olive D. Hormel Begins Lectures Monday, Oct. 14

According to the lecturer, Olive Deane Hormel, world trends as reflected in current books and plays will be discussed.

The series of eight lectures, six on books and two on plays, will open Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Baldwin Public Library. Subjects, as has already been announced, are "Modern Masters of Books," "Books to Share," "Highlights of the Early American Period—Our Neighbors to the North and South," "The Larger View—Literature of World Affairs," "The New American," and the "Ten Best Plays of 1940-41."

Five years ago at the urging of friends, Miss Hormel made a vocation of her avocations of reading and play-going. Since then, her audience has grown from an intimate group in her home town of Oshtemo to more than 1,200 throughout Michigan and neighboring States.

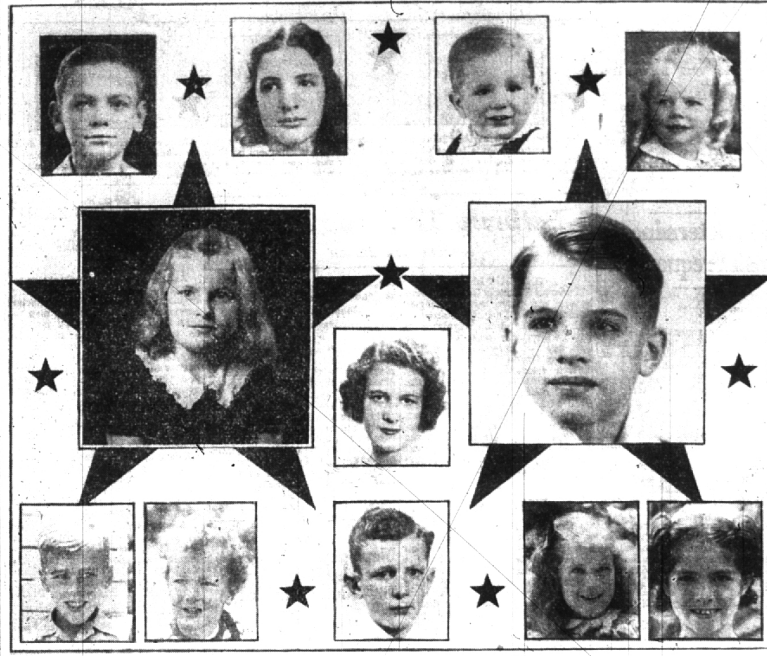
