

Sewerage Project Gets City's OK

After many weeks of discussion, the City Commission decided Monday night that it is for the public interest to improve the sewerage system in the Birmingham Estates subdivision, in northeast Birmingham, lying from Adams to Eton and from Buckingham to East Maple.

The method of assessment has not yet been determined by Assessor Elmer Haack, who is recovering from an appendectomy.

Plan Reduced

The plan adopted by the City Commission is somewhat smaller than that originally laid out by the engineers, cutting the estimated cost from \$22,000 to \$19,200.

Removed from the new plan is one-half block of Cambridge road; and Dorchester from Rugby to Adams. City Manager Donald C. Egbert declared that the new plan would be adequate for rainfall which does not exceed 2 inches per hour, which is the usual maximum planned for.

Even that plan is not satisfactory to the Grand Trunk Railway, which owns most of the triangle in the subdivision east of the tracks. C. P. Halliday, of Royal Oak, representing the railway, presented an alternate plan calling for a steeper grade of the sewer on Rugby, and costing about \$10,000, which it was said would give relief. He protested the Grand Trunk's paying on an equal basis, saying that the company's land received very little benefit.

Egbert and City Engineer H. H. Corson both took a stand against any project which would give only temporary relief and they consented to the railway, view that its land would not receive equal benefits.

Carey Favors Project

Chief spokesman in favor of the project Monday night was Frederick A. Carey, 1231 Buckingham. He pointed out that he never had had trouble, but said that as long as the trouble existed, there would be a reflection on the whole subdivision, hampering development and depressing values. The Birmingham Estates association favors correction of the trouble, he said.

Another resident also held that certain areas derived more benefits than others, and he said that these people should pay more. When the assessment roll is prepared, another hearing will be called.

Remember to Serve Right Foods To Your Lively, Growing Children

One of the best aids to good teeth is the proper diet. Parents should remember this and serve juice and pour the mixture in a flat pan. Chill until firm and cut in tiny cubes. Fill sherbet cups with the gelatin cubes, pineapple, grapes and cherries, garnish with sprigs of fresh mint.

Apple and Orange Betty

3 apples.
2 oranges.
1/2 cup brown sugar.
1/2 lb. macaroons.
Butter.

Slice apple and remove core section. Arrange a layer of apples and a layer of oranges in greased baking dish. Sprinkle with brown sugar and a little salt, then add a layer of crushed macaroons and dot with bits of butter. Repeat the process until all ingredients are used. Bake in an oven 375 degrees about 25 minutes or until apples are tender. Serve hot or cold with cream or hard sauce.

Baked Eggs

3 cups mashed potatoes.
2 tablespoons butter.
1/2 cup milk.
Salt, pepper, paprika.
2 tablespoons chopped chives.
3 eggs.

Add the butter and milk to the hot mashed potatoes and season to taste. Beat well. Add the chives and spread in a shallow greased baking dish. Make 5 hollows and in each place a raw egg. Sprinkle with paprika and salt. Bake in a moderate oven until the eggs are firm.

Scrambled Eggs

6 eggs.
1/2 to 1 cup milk.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 cup flour.
3 tablespoons butter or margarine.

Beat the eggs slightly and add the milk, salt and pepper. Mix the fat slowly in a skillet. Pour in the egg mixture and cook. As soon as the eggs begin to set, stir them up from the bottom and the sides of the pan until they are fluffy and creamy, remove from heat and serve at once with breakfast bacon and slices of tomatoes.

Beef Paprika

1 cup sliced onions.
3 tablespoons shortening.
1 1/2 lbs. of cubed beef.
1 cup flour.
3 cups hot water.
2 teaspoons vinegar.
1 tablespoon paprika.
Salt.

2 tablespoons undiluted evaporated milk.

Saute onions in the shortening, add the beef, sear till brown. Sprinkle with the flour and add the hot water, vinegar, paprika and salt to taste. Simmer for an hour or more. Add the evaporated milk for gloss and richness. Serve in a noodle ring.

Baked Liver Loaf

1 lb. beef liver.
1 cup bread crumbs.
2 tablespoons melted margarine.
1 beaten egg.
3/4 teaspoon salt.
Pepper, paprika.
2 tablespoons minced onion.
1 1/2 cups hot water.

Four some boiling water over the liver and let stand 5 minutes. Drain and put through the food chopper. Add all the other ingredients but the hot water. Bake in an oven 350 degrees for 1 hour, basting occasionally.

Apple, Celery and Tuna Fish Salad

1 cup apples pared and diced.
2 tablespoons lemon juice.
1 1/2 cups celery diced.
2 cups tuna fish flaked.
1/2 cup mayonnaise.

Sprinkle the apples with the lemon juice and blend with the celery, tuna fish, and mayonnaise. Serve in crisp lettuce.
