Pilots in Training At Kelly Field

Pilots to man the planes of the expanding Air Corps are being trained in an ever increasing number. Four Michigan Flying Cadets including a Birmingham resident, are among the 225 pilots-to-be who were recently transferred from Randolph Field to Kelly Field for their final phase of training before receiving their wings and shoulder bars as Second Lieutenants in the Air Corps Reserve.

Among them is Garrett W. Mack, 1273 Yorkshire, Birmingham, who will log a final 75 hours of flying time at the Advanced Flying School before swapping their cadet blue uniforms for the olive drab of officer-pilots.

135 Flying Time

Behind these Michigan student fliers are 20 weeks of intensive flight training, approximately 135 hours of flying time, almost equally divided between dual instruction and solo flying. Sixty-five hours were entered in their log books at one of the elementary flying schools during their first ten weeks. An additional 70 hours, these in 450 horsepower basic training planes, were logged at Kelly Field, Kelly Field, Texas, during the second two week period.

Final stepping stone before commissioning as officer-pilots is a final period of advanced training at Kelly Field. They will be ready to take their place along with the veterans of pursuit, bombardment, attack, and observation squadrons of the army Air Corps.

Under the accelerated pilot training program which the Air Corps inaugurated early this summer, nearly 1,000 Flying Cadets start their careers in military aviation every five weeks. First step in their training is at one of 18 elementary flying schools under contract to the Air Corps and using Air Corps planes and equipment.

Radiator Painting Requires Care

In painting radiators and pipes never before painted, the surface should first be cleaned thoroughly with wire brushes to remove all traces of rust, dirt, and grease. A priming coat of a good road lead should then be applied.

In the case of pipes and radiators that have been painted before and that show some defect, such as blistering or peeling, the old finish should be removed and the priming coat applied. If the old finish shows no defects, the priming coat may be omitted.

Consider Room Scheme

In painting pipes and radiators the decorative requirements of the room should be considered. If a light-colored flat paint is desired, upon only a second coat applied to approximately the color desired in the finishing coat. Then follow with its finishing coat tinted to the desired color. When a full gloss is desired, a good prepared primer should be used for the finishing coat.
