PEONIES

Planting is the only time that peony falling is really successful. Plant the roots with the eyes not deeper than two to three inches. Be sure not to injure the eyes, for they are the beginning of next year's growth. Single peonies are becoming very popular. These include the water-lily type and the Japanese. They are available in all peony shades: white, yellow, pink and red. If you have not already had your peonies, try putting bone meal around them now and working it into the soil. Next year's blooms will show you the results.

GOURDS

Most gourd growers advise picking gourds before frost. Lately, however, a specialist advised picking gourds when ripe—which thought sounds reasonable. Gourds develop all along the vine and the amount available depends as much on the length of the growing season as on the vitality and strength of the vine. It is therefore sensible to gather each gourd at the time it, individually, is ripe. To pick the gourd, leaving some of the stem on the fruit, is a necessary step toward satisfactory ripening. Thick shelled or varnish are apt to do more harm than good. A thin coat of clear shellac, followed by waxing is most natural in effect and most apt to preserve the

New Phone Directory To Put Suburbanites All in One Section

With the new Detroit telephone directory scheduled for distribution next month, the Michigan Bell Telephone Company announced today that the listings in the suburban section will be arranged alphabetically in one continuous list for the first time.

Henry C. Kulling, general directory manager for the company who made the announcement, said that in the past, persons wishing to call residents of Detroit suburbs but not knowing whether they resided in Royal Oak, Ferndale, Pleasant Ridge or other nearby communities, have had difficulty in finding their telephone numbers. That has resulted in considerable demand, he added, for a change in the suburban listing plan along these lines. He anticipates the new plan will result in a further convenience for those calling suburban subscribers.

Telephone users in 22 communities near Detroit will be notified. The sole exception to this plan will be Windsor, whose subscribers will continue to be listed under the name, "Windsor." In the suburban section, as usual, will appear listings for "yellow pages" of the new directory.

Under the new plan, for example, "Kulling said, "a person desiring to call John Doe at Birmingham would look up the 'D's' in the suburban section of the directory and not under a separate heading, 'Birmingham,' as now. The listing will show his address and thus identify him as a resident of Birmingham."

Fail in Attempt To Rear Sturgeon

ALLEGAN—Failure to rear sturgeon in captivity as disclosed when the drawing of the Allegan rearing pond maintained by the fish division of the conservation department.

Ten sturgeon netted at the Allegan dam on the Kalamazoo river last May had been placed in the pond which was drained recently when some loss of fingerling bluegills occurred. Three of the 10 sturgeon were found to have died also. The 368,000 bluegills taken from the pond were planted in Allegan rotan covey lakes. The drained pond disclosed no evidence of young sturgeon.

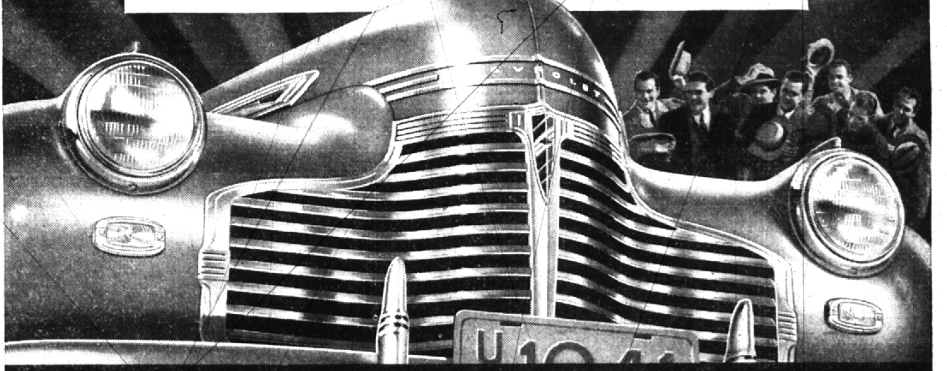
