What the well dressed woman will wear this winter was shown to a large audience of Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills women who assembled Tuesday afternoon at the community house for the tea and style show which was sponsored by the American Association of University Women.

Street gowns, many with the new and gracefully flattering pencil silhouette, and various styles of shirtmaker frocks in a variety of soft shades, with evening gowns for formal occasions and dinner frocks for less formal occasions.

All gowns shown Tuesday were by American designers who have, since the outbreak of the European war, taken virtual command of the dress designing field.

Necessaries were used prominently in Tuesday's style show and in many instances gave a gay dash to an already lovely costume. Bread trim seemed especially in vogue and was used, in several instances, effectively at the hip as well as at the neckline.

Hats appear, in the main, to be a variation of the old and reliable poke bonnet. The bonnet, however, has been dressed up so that even its ancestors will scarcely recognize it. Veils that dip gracefully down over the eyes and end just above the tip of the nose were but one of the details that have rejuvenated last year's poke bonnet.
