

Symes-Campbell Rites Performed Before Altar Banked with Dahlias

Dorothy Jane Campbell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Maurice Campbell, of California drive, and Douglas L. Symes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Symes, of Pleasant Ridge, exchanged their vows Saturday evening at a wedding service at the First Baptist Church with the Rev. J. O. Nelson officiating.

Dahlias, asters and gladioli decorated the chancel which was lighted by ivory tapers in cathedral candelabra.

The bride's gown of ivory satin was fashioned on princess lines with a pointed bodice and circular skirt ending in a long train.

Her fingertip veil was fastened to a tulle halo with a jewel of great-great-grandmother, and her lace handkerchief was one carried by her mother at her wedding.

On their return from a trip through the Cranbrook Institute of Science by J. L. Smith of Royal Oak who, with his daughter Margaret, spent several months last spring in that territory, gathering museum specimens and taking motion pictures of Indians and the Djuka tribe of Bush Negroes.

This band is composed of the descendants of negro slaves who escaped from their plantation owners more than a hundred years ago, defeated all efforts at recapture and finally, granted immunity by the whites, have built a culture of their own which in many ways closely resembles that of their African forebears.

Among the specimens now on display are brilliant metallic blue "Morpho" butterflies whose iridescent wings are used in costume jewelry and the making of "flower pictures"; the giant "lantern flies" whose curious, over-size heads are said to be luminous; the light night; and Thyrsia moths which sometimes attain a wing-spread of 12 inches.

There are tarantulas or "bird spiders," bigger than a man's fist, who leap to catch their prey; scorpions; and other specimens from the liana-hung tropical forests.

They have been loaned to the Birmingham library through the courtesy of the Cranbrook Institute of Science and anyone who has become interested in the small exhibit is invited to visit the larger collection at Cranbrook, where photographs of the Djukas and South American Indians, together with weapons and handicrafts of Venezuelan Indians from the collection of Dudley M. Blakey, are on exhibition.

Operating under the guest conductor plan, and presenting in addition one of the most impressive lists of celebrated soloists in its history, the Detroit Symphony Orchestra will open its 27th season Thursday night, Oct. 17, in Masonic Temple.

A total of 45 performances is scheduled for the coming winter, made up of five different courses of concerts: 14 Thursday nights; six Friday matinees; repeat performances of as many preceding Thursdays; 10 Saturday night "pop" concerts; six Saturday morning Young People's programs and six free concerts in the Ballet for school children.
