

# Woman's Club to Observe 50th Anniversary With Gala Meeting Tuesday

## Past Presidents Will Be Honored On This Occasion

Fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the Birmingham Woman's club is to be observed Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock when the group convenes for its first fall meeting. The meeting, as all Woman's club meetings, is to be held in the auditorium of Baldwin Public Library.

It was in 1898 that Mrs. Augustus March, widow of the Presbyterian minister, attended a Presbyterian meeting in Grand Rapids. While there she was a guest of the Woman's club. Enthused, Mrs. March came back to Birmingham imbued with the idea of starting a similar group in Birmingham.

The first group there was called the Ladies' Literary club and the first meeting was held in the Presbyterian home on Maple avenue and Bates street. Subsequent meetings were held in the homes of members.

This club became federated with the state group in 1899, with Oakland County in 1901 and with the Detroit City Federation in 1919.

The club has been a moving factor in many improvements made in the community such as gas, electric light, good roads and schools.

An historical program, highlighting important events in the club's history, has been planned by Mrs. Warren C. Pratt and Mrs. Fred S. Rose. Mrs. Harry Allen will review the history.
