A Private Meeting With Dionne Quints
As for myself, I had approached the idea of a visit with the Dionne quintuplets with some skepticism, for I know how easily publicity can "build up" either scenery or personality. The pictures I had seen of these six-year-old girls, while cute, had never deeply impressed me. So when our motor coach reached Callander Monday morning, August 19, and after we had breakfast as guests of Leonard Wozniak, entertaining proprietor of the Red Lane Inn, I cast up the quintuplets' nursery two and one half miles from Callander's "Down town section" with the feeling of one who has been to Coney Island a thousand times in succession. I am eager to have the proceedings over with, and continue the trip. Perhaps it was the fact that our party of 36 were the first "press" of the quintuplets ever given to more than two or three persons, in private.

We See Camp Where Germans Are Held
Monday night found our editorial party at the famous Muskoka Lodge, on Lake Muskoka, a famous and elite summer resort of immense size. It now caters to folk of all nations, and is well spent during a part of your vacation at. Douglas Stankov and his amiable wife operate the establishment, which annually is patronized by hundreds of Canadians and Americans. In keeping with the Dominion hospitality, we were given another banquet that evening. By this time, folks, I guess each of our party had added 10, more or less, pounds to his weight. Food is certainly not scarce in war-time Canada. The next morning, after breakfast, we boarded the steamer Cherokee, bound for Graymont, on the lower end of Lake Muskoka. Much beautiful scenery was everywhere to be seen, and the trip, which lasted several hours. Just as we were about to enter Graymont we were held up by a German submarine. The vessel was used as an internment camp for 500 German prisoners of war, who were held there for a few days before we passed it. I took several pictures of it, and the harbor with fine built all around it. The youngsters were, to my delightful surprise, unspoiled, quiet, natural, full of poise. But this is a definite part of their upbringing for children at all. The other eight Dionne children, the oldest 13 and the youngest two, born since the arrival of the famous five, mix and mingle with their quintet sisters; there is, I learned, some jealousy among the eight. Mr. and Mrs. Dionne live in the same house where the parents of Mr. Dionne lived; Para Dionne was born in the same bed that his quintuplets were born in; the house is definitely small for so large a family, and, except for a few furnishings purchased in recent years, is just as it came to earth; outside plumbing, even, is still utilized by the Dionne's who, in spite of government income of over \$5,000 annually, plus plenty of cash from their curio and souvenir store, refuse to modernize their shelter.

Canada's Act Flyers Put on Exhibition
One of the high points on the trip, from a military standpoint, was our visit to Camp Borden, a military installation at Borden, Ontario. In this camp, Canada's largest, are 50,000 men in training. It is here that combat flyers, navigators, bombers, flyers, necessary to aerial warfare, are given their final training, then sent over to England. Dr. D. Cowley, Commanding Officer of the Royal Canadian Air Force, and his staff, are housed in a hospitable host. We were driven to the airfield where the Camp's grand banquet was awaiting us. Our party sat down with approximately 125 of the officers for the meal. The meal was served by civilian orderlies who marched in with each course, in single file, but one right after another. Captain Cowley spoke briefly of the part the Camp is playing in this war, and expressed his own personal appreciation of our entire party at Camp Borden, as I had been the night before at Muskoka Lodge. And so we left Camp Borden after the banquet, our party and the officers gathered in the officers' lounge, singing "Auld Lang Syne, between each other a civilian, our arms inter-locked and swaying side-ways to the musical ring of it. It was a grand few hours of military-civilian camaraderie, not to be forgotten by any of us in attendance. And then back to our motor coach where we tiredly, but happily, climbed aboard and less than two hours later found ourselves back in Toronto.
