Verne C. Hampton Seeks Re-election

Verne C. Hampton, Circuit Court Commissioner, has announced his candidacy for re-election. The primary is next Tuesday.

He issued the following statement:

"In announcing my candidacy for re-election to one of the two offices of Circuit Court Commissioner, I desire to point out to the voters that this year for the first time the office to be voted upon will be found on the separate Judicial Ballot and not on the regular party ballot. This change was brought about by a Constitutional

amendment approved at the State Spring election in 1931.

"During the 3 1/2 years that I have served the northern section of the county as Circuit Court Commissioner, there have been filed over 3,000 real and land contract cases. Of this number, only two have been appealed to the Circuit Court, and the decisions were in each instance affirmed. This is given to show the savings to the taxpayers in keeping down the expense of the operation of the Circuit Court and giving to that Court more time to spend upon matters originally arising in the Circuit Court.

"Under my direction, by decree of the Circuit Court, over \$4,000,000 in bids have been received for real estate sold in Oakland County, and it is most important that the records and instruments of sale be drawn by one schooled in real estate law.

"It has always been my desire to conscientiously serve you as Commissioner and I would appreciate your further consideration at this Fall's election."
