Gardeners' Corner

With all the dampness we have had, it is already time to transplant any plants that you wish to move this fall. Any moving to be done within the garden can take place at any time. Leave enough earth on the roots, and water after setting in its new home and a plant will grow as if nothing had happened to it. The only drawback is to cure the moving fever, once you have realized that it does more good than harm to transport your garden from one spot to another. One woman was accused of having her garden blooming in her wheelbarrow, as it went from front to back and back again.

Plants received from nurseries are more apt to die if not promptly planted. If by any chance they have been en route longer than the packer foreman, the moss or packing might dry out. In this case, soak the roots in a mud bath before planting. Mists for fall planting are peonies and lilacs, Oriental poppies, Japanese irises and bleeding hearts.

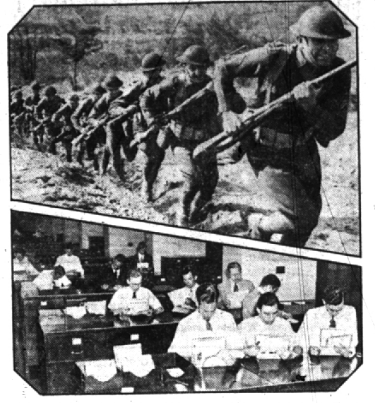

Big Organization Needed To Effect National Draft



From office, factory and farm, the nation's young men will be called for a year's compulsory military service.

WASHINGTON—Lights are burning late in Washington these nights as the War Department prepares to put into effect the first military service draft law in the peacetime history of the United States.

The measure provides that men currently employed in industries vital to the national defense program, officials of the state and federal governments, clergymen, and those with bona fide moral scruples against serving in armed forces shall be exempt.

Some officials say never in peacetime will it be necessary to call up men with dependents. FIRST MEN to be drafted for the year's service provided for in the measure will range in age from 21 to 31. Initial conscription to start service this fall will be 400,000 men; during the first year about 1,500,000 will be drafted. Choice will be made by the tradition "draft method"—by lottery.

The War Department estimates that 12,000 registration places will be required to enroll the 42,000 men in the War Department's draft law covered those from 18 to 45; 24,234,000 registered, and about one in eight saw actual service.

Is Fascism Efficient?

We must therefore adopt them temporarily to build our military defense and to prepare for economic competition from abroad after the war." In this line, Dr. Nazism, or fascism, really more subtle than five enterprise and representative government.

Germany has applied mass production method to the making of armaments. But where were these methods first developed and applied? She is making much of a new weapon of war—the airplane. But where was the airplane invented and put to greatest practical use? Why, in Germany, the fastest, most durable and most powerful aircraft.

Hitler also rejected the slogan of monopolistic unionism, "The shorter the hours, the higher the pay." In its place he adopted the principle, "He who will not work, neither shall he eat." Aside from these two things, Nazism has been economic and industrial industry in Germany.
