## Leon Adds New Electric Pad Device

A new type of an electric pad, said to be of great value in reducing is now in service at Leon's Parisian Beauty Shop, located in the Eastern Building, 55 W. Maple. Through the stimulation and exercising of the muscles, it is possible to reduce both pounds and inches by this new type of beauty treatment, Leon says.

With this system, the muscles are rapidly contracted and relaxed to the extent that about 35 minutes of treatment is said to be equal to a 2 1/2-mile walk. The main idea is to reduce the anatomy only where it is necessary so as to achieve a more balanced figure.

Electric pads are placed on the body where needed most—such as on the mid-rib, knees, thighs, or upper arms. Two little pads can be placed under the chin, to lift and tone the muscles there too. About one hour should be allowed for each treatment. This includes the period of relaxing just before the pads are applied.
