GATHERING HERBS

Almost the most exciting time in a herb garden is the time of harvesting. Most of the herbs can be dried and so saved for winter use. The general rule is to pick herbs for drying as they are coming into bloom. Do your gathering in the morning as soon as the dew is dry, before the heat of the day.

There is a certain amount of controversy about sun or shade as being most suitable for the actual drying. We belong to the "shade" school, drying on screens in a warm but airy place. The old fashioned bundles of herbs, tied to rafters, may look picturesque but they are apt to become quite dusty unless protected with bags. The easiest way to keep herbs is to dry them on screens, then store them in air tight containers.

In cutting herbs, cut the annuals to the ground and the perennials about 2/3 of the way down (or your plant will die in winter). It is best in the case of most herbs, to take the leaves off the branches before drying. Parsley may be dried more quickly (for example by placing it for a short time in a hot oven) and so it will keep a nice green color.

Some herbs may be preserved in vinegar or rather vinegar may be flavored by filling the bottle with the fresh herb (as tarragon) and using this vinegar later in salads.
