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Rotary Addressed By City Manager

"Problems of City Government" was the topic discussed before Birmingham Rotarians Monday noon by Donald C. Egbert, City Manager. He was introduced by Rotarian Charles B. Randall at the Community House.

Mr. Egbert said that Birmingham is rapidly reducing its total bonded debt, due to the high mark of tax returns by local property owners; in fact of 1936 the total debt was \$1,320,000 to which was added \$212,000 in special sewer bonds, but in spite of this increase, since 1936 the total debt now stands at only \$1,290,000.

Among the current and immediate future problems in Birmingham, according to Mr. Egbert, are need for more complete water and sewer main extensions; continued search for new deep well water sources and installation of deep well pumps; eventual treatment of water to eliminate iron and other foreign contents; changing of many gravel streets into hard-surfaced tops, either of concrete or black-top; development of existing park and recreational facilities; widening of West Maple Avenue and better downtown parking areas.

He also stated that Birmingham citizens should co-operate with the local police department in decreasing traffic hazards and accidents.

"The City Commission believes, due to the war, that serious financial problems may be ahead of Birmingham, and so it has decided that any capital investments for Birmingham are out for the duration of the emergency," declared Manager Egbert.

At the conclusion of his talk a number of questions pertaining to portions of his remarks were asked by some of the Rotarians.

There's No Shortage In Lumber Supply

To lay pessimism among prospective home builders occasioned by dire interpretations of the recently published SPAB building construction policy, Donald Nelson, Director of the Office of Production Administration, Washington, D. C., has made public a recent letter to Senator Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin. Mr. Nelson explains that only certain critical raw materials of which there is an acute shortage, will not be available for production. This does not mean that all home building must cease. A very satisfactory home can be built without these items. For instance, the most acute shortage is copper. Copper cutters are not essential; wood gutters are attractive, economical, and applicable. Nails are steel bands necessary, there are good substitutes standing today, as they have stood for hundreds of years on wood beams. There is no "bottle-neck" in lumber.

House Remodeling Is Made Easier

Urgently needed repairs and remodeling to provide housing for defense workers will be facilitated by recent simplification of the procedure for accepting defense housing installment repair loans from the Federal Reserve Board's credit-controlling Regulation W. Federal Housing Administrator Abner H. Ferguson announced last week.

Under the revised procedure, applications for designation of any remodeling or rehabilitation job as "defense housing" (and therefore exempt from Regulation W) may now be handled entirely by any of the 16 field offices of the Division of Housing Coordination, "withhold having" referred to the Coordinator in Washington.

The application may be submitted, by either the borrower or the institution, directly to the nearest field office. The field representative will have the power to act under authority given him by the Coordinator.
