War Stirs Telephoning

Frank Curtis, director of public relations, Bell Telephone Co., is being told by the "transgenic" sales which doubled the British pounds immediately following the Japanese bombing of Pearl Harbor.

He was obliged to call 10,000 conveyors to care for the long distance traffic; there were 500 conveyors more on the line than on any previous day in the history of the company.

"On Monday 18,000 direct distance calls were made; this figure did not include state calls," he said.

The Bell Telephone Co. in the United States is making 100 million proof of a 100,000,000 call, including long distance calls, one million every day. Also, these United States have one-half of all the phones in the world. Steel can't cost too much.

The Bell Telephone Co. has developed through its laboratories 2,275 patents in an alternate 10 years and listed 15 activities.
