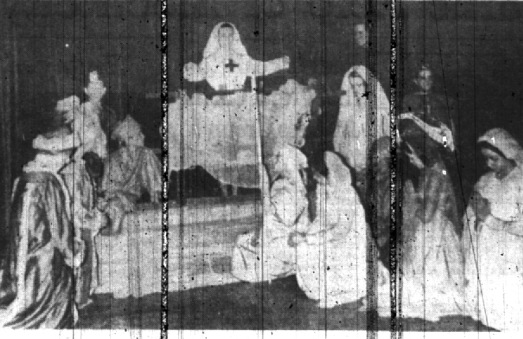
## Sale of Stamps Jumps at School

# Barnum Junior High to Present Cantata-Pageant Tonight

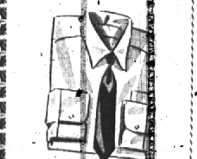


This is a scene from the Barnum Christmas pageant to be given tonight at the Red Cross.

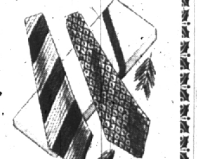
