rich program in the area and in the art of living—for it is true that one of life's most valuable areas of knowledge is the ability to get along with other people. It is in the necessity of meeting the changes, the growth of life as they relate to growing boys and girls, so I favor a flexible educational program.

"A carefully prepared and presented vocational guidance program, in the school system, is destined to become the very part of our secondary schools in the United States."

Is Community Problem. Admitting that the schools alone cannot solve the complex problem of educating youth, Dr. Shibler asked for wholehearted co-operation from the various civic groups in the Birmingham

school district. He said that the present world emergency is over many problems will confront America, including the educational system in every state; he acknowledged his belief that as the federal government does the State now, will provide a portion of the funds to our public schools. "I know that such financial aid from the side suggests loss of local control in some degree," said the new superintendent. "But we cannot stop this trend, although we can endeavor to prevent undemocratic invasion of local controls over our public schools."

Concluding his talk, Dr. Shibler stated "I earnestly ask your support for the building of an educational program for the youth of Birmingham and vicinity which, trust, will be second to none in the entire United States. My office shall always be open to persons and groups in this community, for only by the integration of our combined talents and hopes and endeavors can a cooperative enterprise like education succeed."

H. Ross Mack, school trustee presided at the dinner. A brief talk of welcome to Dr. and Mrs. Shibler was given by Mayor John E. Martz. Dr. Shibler formally was introduced by Lee A. Jolly, Jr., president of the Board of Education members present were W. Seaborn, Wylie Groves, and J. H. Russo.

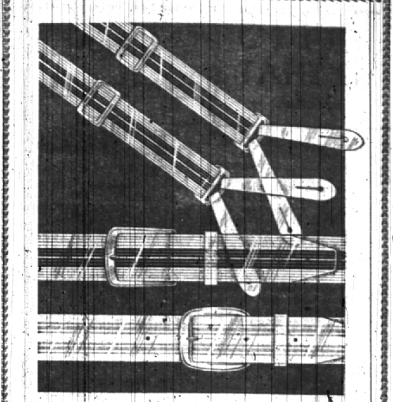
