Birmingham led at the first quarter by the score of 11-2. Dennis Therian and Stan Peterson were the outstanding players of this period.

The second quarter was marked by fast clean playing with neither team scoring heavily. The score at the half was 23-8 in favor of Birmingham. Captain Jack Steelman, right forward, played a fine game of ball and kept the boys working together at all times.

In the third quarter the Maple offense really started clicking and the score was upped up to 25-12 before the period ended. W. Lash, Roosevelt right forward, was outstanding for his fast aggressive playing to both offense and defense.

In the final quarter the Pistons attacked the Maples more closely and checked them farther down the floor. This kept the local team from having a chance to get to any great extent. Both Peterson, Birmingham guard, and Stan Peterson, Keego Harbor guard, were forced to leave the game on four personals. The final score was 27-17.

The high score for the game was Dennis Therian, Birmingham center, who has already earned two letters in basketball. He made 12 points.

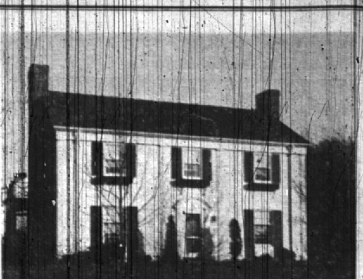
