Cranbrook Offers Scholarships Again

Cranbrook School announces its sixth annual competition for the selection of several outstanding boys to receive scholarships at the school for the 1941-42 term. The competition is limited to boys who will be ready to enter the 9th, 10th, or 11th grade in Sept. 1941, although Cranbrook offers instruction from the 8th through the 12th grades as well as a year of post-graduate training.

The scholarship examinations will be given about the middle of April, but all boys who wish to compete must file their applications before 7:30 p.m. April 4. Candidates must take the examinations in their home cities under the supervision of examiners approved by the school. In addition to the results of the tests, the committee awarding these scholarships will consider each candidate's previous school record, character, leadership, special scholastic abilities, health and athletic ability. After the winners have been selected, the amount of the scholarship to be granted to each boy is fixed to the mutual satisfaction of the boy's parents and the school.

No boy will be granted more than \$1,000 for the school year, the average grant being about one-half the school's annual fee.
