of University Women, is now professor of economics and sociology at the Connecticut College in New Haven. She has traveled in Europe and taken part in education seminars in Mexico, Cuba, Porto Rico and at the present time is state educational chairman of the Connecticut University Women's group.

She speaks Tuesday morning to the International Relations class on "Some Aspects of our Good Neighbor Policy—Especially in Mexico." This class meets at 10 o'clock in the Community House and all past and present members of the class are invited to attend.

Dr. James has attended Brown University, Yale, Harvard, University of Paris and the Loomis School of Economics. She has a Ph. D. from both Brown and Yale; teaches history now at Connecticut College and is professor of social sciences at the New Haven State Teachers College, affiliated with Yale.

She has published many articles in professional journals; her books include "Sociological Survey of Providence," and "Educational History of Connecticut, 1633-1925." She is now working on an "Educational History of Connecticut" under the direction of
